To the Board of Regents and members of the Nevada Senate and Assembly:

My name is Joel Edwards and I am a new graduate student at UNR, and I am writing this letter in response to the proposed cuts for the NBMG.

I am from Iowa, born and raised, and received an undergraduate degree from BYU in Utah this past December and have had until recently, relatively no affiliation with the state of Nevada. However, I find myself living here now because of the Nevada Bureau of Mines and Geology and the work they do with geothermal energy. Finishing school up this past year, I knew I was interested in both geology and geothermal energy from my work with Raser Technologies, and I contacted many faculty across the US concerning their research with geothermal energy. Time and time again I was directed to the NBMG and UNR. I discovered, during that time of searching for graduate opportunities, that bar none, the NBMG and UNR were the foremost US research institutions conducting world-class research on geothermal energy. Reno was the place to be if I wanted to be involved in the geothermal industry.
